Types of Co-ops

Casual Co-op

This is a monthly or weekly meet-up for learning and fun outside own your chosen curriculum. There aren't a lot of rules with this one, just more of a focus of building friendships and living a homeschool life together.

Formal Co-op

A formal co-op is typically one with a high commitment requirement, academic or curriculum focus with a shared foundational approach to homeschooling. This co-op tends to meet more regularly and requires high accountability.
